The formation of the new Government

The distribution of the seats

After the legislative elections of June 13th 1999, the distribution of seats in the Chamber of Deputies is as follows:

On June 14th 1999, the day after the elections, the Grand Duke and the Crown Prince gave an audience to Prime Minister Jean-Claude Juncker, who presented the Grand Duke with the Government's resignation following the legislative elections held on June 13th 1999.

In the meantime, the Head of State asked the Government to remain in office until the formation of a new Government. Until then its actions should remain restricted to the management of daily administrative matters.

The designation of the formator

On June 15th 1999, the Grand Duke gave audiences respectively to Mr Jean Spautz, outgoing President

of the Chamber of Deputies, Mr Paul Beghin, President of the Council of State, and the Chairmen and representatives of the political parties and groups which won mandates to the Chamber of Deputies in the legislative elections held on June 13th 1999, that is to say: the Chairman of the Christian Social Party, Mrs Erna Hennicot-Schoepges, the Chairman of the Democratic Party, Mrs Lydie Polfer, the Chairman of the Luxembourg Socialist Workers' Party, Mr Jean Asselborn, the Chairman of the ADR Action Committee for Democracy and Pension Rights, Mr Robert Mehlen, the spokespersons for the Green Party, Mrs Marthy Thull and Mr Carlo de Toffoli, and the candidate for the Left Party, Mr André Hoffmann. The Grand Duke wanted to consult them regarding to the formation of the new Government.

Following these consultations, the Grand Duke and the Crown Prince received Mr Jean-Claude Juncker, Prime Minister, Minister of State in order to charge him with forming the Government.

The Christian Social Party and the Democratic Party

During the afternoon of June 16th, the National Council of the Christian Social Party instructed the directorate of the party to enter into coalition negotiations with the Democratic Party. During an audience at the Grand Ducal Palace, Mr Jean-Claude Juncker reported to the Grand Duke and the Crown Prince on steps to be taken to fulfil his task. During a press conference, Mr Juncker then informed the press on the phases by which he will form the Government.

On June 18th, Mr Jean-Claude Juncker, charged with

the formation of the Government and acting as the Prime Minister had a first interview with Mrs Lydie Polfer, Chairman, and Mr Henri Grethen, Secretary General of the Democratic Party.

On June 22nd, Mr Jean-Claude Juncker reported to the Grand Duke and the Crown Prince regarding his interviews with the Chairman of the Democratic Party, Mrs Lydie Polfer.

The coalition negotiations

The coalition negotiations started on June 24th 1999, with a first meeting of the delegations of both parties at the Ministry of Agriculture.

Mr Jean-Claude Juncker, Mrs Erna Hennicot-Schoepges, Mr Michel Wolter, Mr Fernand Boden, Mrs Marie-Josée Jacobs, Mr Luc Frieden, Mr Jean Spautz, Mr Lucien Weiler and Mr Claude Wiseler took part in the negotiations on behalf of the Christian Social Party. The Democratic Party was represented by Mrs Lydie Polfer, Mr Henri Grethen, Mrs Anne Basseur, Mrs Colette Flesch, Mr Charles Goerens, Mr Paul Helminger, Mr Jean Krantz, Mr Kik Schneider and Mr Carlo Wagner.

On June 25th, July 2nd, July 8th, July 16th, July 23rd, July 27th and August 5th the Grand Duke and the Crown Prince gave audiences to Mr Jean-Claude Juncker, charged with the formation of the Government, who reported to them on the progress made in the coalition negotiations.

Press conferences took place on June 24th and 29th, on July 1st, 8th, 17th and 27th as well as on August 4th.

The nomination and swearing in of the members of the new government

On August 6th 1999, the results of the negotiations were confirmed by the competent authorities of both parties.

On August 7th 1999, Mr Jean-Claude Juncker gave an account of the fulfilment of his mission as formator to His Royal Highness, the Grand Duke, and His Royal Highness, the Crown Prince.

In the morning of the same day, the Grand Duke gave audience to the leaving members of the government: Mr A. Bodry, Mrs M. Delvaux-Stehres, and Mr G. Wohlfahrt. Due to health reasons, Mrs Lydie Err could not receive the audience of the Grand Duke.

Then he swore in the new members of the government and signed the grand-ducal decree writing down the nomination of the new government.

Declaration of the Government on August 12th 1999

The Parliament met again on August 12th 1999 in order to listen to the declaration of the government which was presented by Mr Jean-Claude Juncker, Prime Minister, Minister of State. The debates on the declaration were held on August 13th 1999.

Jean-Claude **Juncker**

Prime Minister / Minister of State
Minister of Finance

Mr Jean-Claude Juncker was born in Redange-sur-Attert, on December 9th 1954. He is married and lives in Capellen.

He went to primary school in Belvaux (mining region) and to secondary school in Clairefontaine (1967-1974). He obtained his final secondary school diploma at the Lycée Michel Rodange in Luxembourg City. Mr Juncker went on to the Faculty of Law at the University of Strasbourg (1975-1979), where he got a Master's degree in Law in 1979. He was admitted to the Bar of Luxembourg in February 1980.

He became President of the Christian Social Youth from 1979 to 1985 after having joined the Christian Social Party in 1974. Mr Juncker was entrusted with the post of Parliamentary Secretary of the Christian Social Party from October 1979 until December 1982, when he was appointed State Secretary for Labour and Social Affairs.

In June 1984, he was first elected Member of Parliament in the southern district constituency on the Christian Social Party's list. Mr Juncker was appointed Minister of Labour and Minister in charge of the Budget on July 20th 1984. In the second half of 1985, Mr Juncker chaired the Council of Ministers for Social Affairs and the Budget of the European Community.

He was re-elected in the southern district constituency on the Christian Social Party's list in June 1984. He was then appointed Minister of Labour and Minister of Finance by Prime Minister Jacques Santer – from July 14th 1989 to July 12th 1994. In the first half of 1991, he chaired the Council of Ministers of Social Affairs, Economic, Financial Affairs and of the Budget of the European Community. He was also President of the Intergovernmental Conference on Economic and Monetary Union.

After the general elections of June 12th 1994, Mr Juncker was appointed Minister of Labour and Minister of Finance – from July 13th 1994 to January 20th 1995. On January 20th 1995, Mr Juncker became Prime Minister following Jacques Santer's nomination for the Presidency of the European Commission. In the government he formed on January 26th 1995, he assumed the responsibilities of Prime Minister, Minister of State, Minister of Finance and Minister of Labour and Employment.

Chief candidate of his party at the legislative elections and candidate for the legislative and European elections of June 13th 1999, he was elected deputy in the southern district constituency on the PCS list and obtained the highest number of votes. Concurrently, he was elected on the first place at the European elections, but he rejected his mandate on July 21st 1999 in order to dedicate himself to the national political scene.

Furthermore, Jean-Claude Juncker was President of the Christian Social Party from January 20th 1990 to February 4th 1995 and President of the European Union of Christian Democratic Workers from March 16th 1993 to January 12th 1995.

Mr Juncker was Governor of the World Bank from August 5th 1989 to February 23rd 1995. On February 6th 1995 he was nominated Governor of the European Investment Bank, as well as Governor of the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development (B.E.R.D.). He became Governor of the International Monetary Fund on February 16th 1995.

During the second half of 1997, Mr Juncker chaired the European Council, which opened the doors of the Union to ten central and eastern European countries, as well as to Cyprus. The Council has also permitted to get over the last obstacles on the way to the single currency. Likewise, Mr Jean-Claude Juncker presided over the European Council, the extraordinary Council on Employment, the Council of Ministers of Finance and Economy and the Council of Ministers of Social Affairs.

On August 7th 1999, Mr Jean-Claude Juncker's appointment as Prime Minister, Minister of State and Minister of Finance was confirmed.

Lydie **Polfer**

Vice-Prime Minister
Minister of Foreign Affairs
and Foreign Trade
Minister of the Civil Service
and Administrative Reform

Mrs Polfer was born on November 22nd 1952 in Luxembourg. She has one daughter, Nora Wurth.

In July 1972, Mrs Polfer graduated from the Lycée Robert Schuman. Four years later she took a BA in Law at the University of Grenoble, and in 1977 joined the Luxembourg Bar. That same year she took an advanced studies diploma in European integration at

the University Centre for International and European Research in Grenoble.

Mrs Lydie Polfer began her political career in 1979 when she was elected to the Luxembourg Parliament for the first time. Thereafter she was successively re-elected in 1984, 1989, 1994 and 1999.

She was a member of the Steering Committee of the Chamber of Deputies as well as of the following committees: the Committee for Local Affairs, Housing and Urban Planning, the Special Committee on "Equal Opportunities for Men and Women", and the Public Service Committee.

In 1982, Mrs Lydie Polfer became Mayor of the City of Luxembourg following the local elections held in October 1981. After that, she was re-elected in 1987 and 1993. Following the June 13th 1999 legislative elections, Mrs Polfer gave up her position as Mayor to enter the Government. She was a Member of the European Parliament from 1985 until 1989 and from 1990 until 1994. It was during that same year that she became Chairwoman of the Democratic Party.

She has been a member of the Committee of the AIMF (International Association of Mayors and Leaders of Towns and Cities either partially or entirely French-speaking). Since 1980 she has been President of the "Racing" basketball club of Luxembourg.

Outgoing Deputy and candidate for her party at the legislative and European elections held on June 13th 1999, she was re-elected Deputy in the Central constituency on the list for the Democratic Party.

After the 1999 legislative elections, she was appointed

Vice-Prime Minister, Minister of Foreign Affairs and External Trade and Minister of the Civil Service and the Administrative Reform.

Fernand **Boden**

Mr Fernand Boden was born in Echternach on September 13th 1943. He is married and has two sons. He still lives in his native town. After completing his secondary education at Echternach's High school, he went on to study mathematics and physics at the "Cours Supérieurs" in Luxembourg and later at the University of Liège where he obtained the title of Doctor of Mathematics and Physics. He taught at Echternach's Classic School from 1966 to 1978.



Mr Fernand Boden enjoys social life and sports; he is a former Luxembourg table tennis champion. He is honorary President of the National Table Tennis Federation and is still actively practising this sport.

As Deputy Mayor of his hometown Echternach from 1970 to 1976, he was also a member of the local council and was elected Member of Parliament for the Christian-Social Party for the first time in 1978 in the eastern district constituency. He was re-elected in 1979 and entered the Cabinet as Minister of Education and Youth as well as Minister of Tourism. He held the same portfolio until 1989.

In 1989, Mr Boden was appointed Minister of Family and Solidarity, and Minister of Middle Classes and Tourism. After the 1994 elections, he became Minister of the Civil Service. The reshuffled cabinet January 26th 1995 gave Mr Boden the duties of Minister of Agriculture, Viticulture and Rural Development, Minister of Middle Classes and Tourism, as well as Minister of Housing.

Candidate of his party for the legislative elections of June 13th 1999, he was re-elected in the eastern district constituency on the list of the Christian Social Party.

After the elections of June 13th 1999, Mr Boden was confirmed in the posts of Minister of Agriculture, Viticulture and Rural Development, Minister of Middle Classes, Tourism and Housing.

Marie-Josée **Jacobs**

Minister of Family,

Minister for the Advancement of Women

Mrs Marie-Josée Jacobs was born on January 22nd 1950 in Marnach, in the north of Luxembourg.

After completing her secondary school at the private school "Saint-Anne" in Ettelbruck, she attended a nursing-school. She obtained her diploma in 1969. Four years later, she got a diploma in nursing-anaesthesiology. Mrs Jacobs worked in this field until her nomination to the post of minister.

While practising her profession, Mrs Jacobs started a political and labour union career.

In the union domain, she is a member of the Christian trade union LCGB. She was President of the private employee's section from 1980 to 1992 and Vice-President of the union from 1981 to 1992.

Mrs Jacobs began her political career in 1967 as a member of the Christian Social Party (PCS). From the start she was part of the committee of the northern region. She was elected President of the Christian Social Women and then President of the PCS of the same region.

Finally, she was elected Vice-President of her party at the national level. In 1984, Mrs Jacobs was first elected deputy in the northern district constituency. She was re-elected in 1989 and in 1994. In 1987, she became city councillor of Luxembourg City.

On December 9th 1992, Mrs Jacobs was appointed Minister of Agriculture, of Viticulture and of Rural Development, as well as Delegate Minister for Cultural Affairs. This job allowed her to participate actively in the organisation of the European Year of Culture in 1995 and thus in the project of Luxembourg City, European capital of culture.

Re-elected in the legislative elections of June 12th 1994, Mrs Jacobs was entrusted with the same ministerial portfolio than in 1992 in the Government formed by the Prime Minister Mr Jacques Santer. After the appointment of Mr Santer to the post of President of the European Commission, Mrs Jacobs was nominated for Minister of Family, Minister for the Advancement of Women, Minister for the Handicapped and Disabled.

Candidate for her party in the legislative elections of June 13th 1999, she is re-elected deputy in the northern district constituency on the list of the Christian Social Party.

Since August 7th 1999, she has been Minister of Family, Social Solidarity and Youth and Minister for the Advancement of Women.

Mrs Hennicot-Schoepges was born in Dudelange, on July 24th 1941. She lives in Walferdange, is married and has three children.

She is a former speaker of Radio Luxembourg. She was a piano teacher at the Academy of Music of Luxembourg City and enjoys a good reputation as a concert pianist.

She was member of the local council of Walferdange

from 1976 to 1987. She became the Mayor of that same town on January 1st 1988 and stayed in this position until January 25th 1995.

On July 24th 1979, she became Member of Parliament after she had been elected on the list of the Christian Social Party in the central district constituency. From 1979 to 1989 she was Chairwoman of the Parliamentary Commission for Education and Culture.

Mrs Hennicot-Schoepges was President of the Parliament with no interruption from July 18th 1989 until her appointment as minister on January 26th 1995. At Parliament she was President of the Parliament Office, President of the Commission for Work and member of the Commission for Petition as well as member of the Commission for Media and Culture. From 1984 to 1989, she was also a member of the parliamentary assembly of the Council of Europe. In this international institution, she was Parliamentary Secretary of the Christian Social Group and member of the Commission for Migrants and Refugees and of the Commission for Education and Culture.

From September 1989 to May 1993 she was Vice-president of the Interregional Parliamentary Council, then President of the same assembly from May 7th 1993 to April 22nd 1994, and finally member from the end of April 1994 to the end of January 1995. Mrs Hennicot-Schoepges was also a member of the parliamentary assembly of the O.S.C.E from July 1991 to January 1995. President of the Luxembourg section of the International Assembly of the frenchspeaking parliamentarians, she was also National Chairwoman of the Christian Social Women (CSF) from 1979 to 1988 and President of the International Foundation

for the Dialogue between Christians, Jews and Moslems until 1997.

Since February 4th 1995, Mrs Hennicot-Schoepges has been President of the Christian Social Party (CSV).

Mrs Hennicot-Schoepges was Minister of Education and Vocational Training, Minister of Culture and Minister of Cults in Prime Minister Jean-Claude Juncker's government from January 26th 1995 until June 14th 1999.

Candidate of her party for the European and legislative elections of June 13th 1999, Mrs Hennicot-Schoepges was re-elected deputy in the central district constituency on the list of the Christian Social Party.

Since August 7th 1999, she has been Minister of Culture, Higher Education and Research and Minister of Public Works.

Michel **Wolter**

Minister of the Interior

Mr Wolter was born in Luxembourg City on September 13th 1962. He is married, has three children and lives in Hautcharage.

Mr Wolter grew up in Esch-sur-Alzette where he attended primary school. He went to secondary school in Esch-sur-Alzette and Echternach. He registered at the University of Paris (Panthéon-Sorbonne) which he left in 1985 with a BA in economics, option world economics.

He started his professional career in a captive reinsurance management company. In 1992, he became a managing director at a reinsurance company.

Member of the Christian Social Party (CSV) since 1980, Mr Wolter also became Member of Parliament for the first time in 1984. Being elected at the age of 21 he was the youngest Member of Parliament ever.

He was re-elected in 1989, 1994 and 1999. Member of the Commission for Finance and Budget, he was appointed reporter for the budget draft for the financial years 1994 and 1995. He was also Vice-president of the Commission for Sports and Youth.

From 1988 to August 1992, Mr Wolter was a city councillor in Esch-sur-Alzette. Then he moved to Hautcharage. After the local elections in October 1993, he was town councillor in Bascharage from January 1994 to January 1995.

From 1985 to 1990, Mr Wolter chaired the Christian Social Youth (CSJ). He was an international table tennis player in the early 80s and was President of the Luxembourg Tennis Federation from March 1987 to January 1994. Today, he is the honorary President of this federation.

He was Minister of the Interior, Minister for the Civil Service and Administrative Reform from January 26th 1995.

Following the elections held on 13th June 1999, he became Minister of the Interior.

Luc **Frieden**

Minister of Treasury and Budget

Minister of Justice

Luc Frieden was born in Esch-sur-Alzette on September 16th 1963. He is married and has two children.

He went to primary school in Esch-sur-Alzette and then on to secondary school at the "Lycée de Garçons" in Esch. In 1982, he obtained his final secondary school diploma (classics/economic science section) at the "Athenée de Luxembourg".

Then, he started studying law at the "Centre universitaire de Luxembourg" and went on to study law at the

"Université de Paris I" (Panthéon-Sorbonne) graduating with a Master's degree in Business Law in 1986.

In 1987, he obtained his Master's degree in comparative Law and Legal Philosophy from the University of Cambridge (UK) and in 1988 a Master of Laws from the Harvard Law School in the United States. He wrote a post-graduate thesis on "Media Newsgathering by Satellites", which was published in 1989 in the Stanford Journal of International Law. He also studied at the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University.

From 1989 to 1998, Luc Frieden was an attorney at the bar of Luxembourg. During the same period, he taught public law at the "Centre Universitaire de Luxembourg" and he wrote a number of articles on banking law and constitutional law. Between 1981 and 1994 he was a regular commentator on legal issues and foreign politics on the Luxembourg radio programme, RTL. He is a member of the "Institut Grand-ducal" (Grand-ducal Institute), in the moral and political science section.

He was first elected Member of Parliament for the Christian Social Party in the central district constituency during the elections of June 12th 1994. He was in office from 1994 to February 1998 and acted as Chairman of the Finance and Budget Committee, Chairman of the Institutions and Constitutional Reform Committee.

On February 4th 1998, Luc Frieden was appointed Minister of Justice, Minister of Budget and Minister of Relations with the Parliament. He was responsible for co-ordinating government business in connection with the introduction of the single European currency to Luxembourg.

Running for his party for the legislative and European elections of June 13th 1999, he was re-elected as a deputy in the central district constituency on the list of the Christian Social Party.

On August 7th 1999, he was nominated to the posts of Minister of Treasury and Budget and of Minister of Justice.

Mr Frieden has also been Governor of the World Bank since February 4th 1998.

Anne **Brasseur**

Minister of National Education,
Vocational Training
and Sports

Mrs Anne Brasseur was born on May 19th 1950 in Luxembourg.

She graduated in 1969, and then left for Germany to study psychology at the Universities of Tübingen and Mannheim. In 1975 she obtained her degree in psychology and became a psychologist with the Psychology and Careers Advisory Department at the Technical College and boys' High school in Esch-sur-Alzette.

From 1976 until 1979, Mrs Brasseur ran the Central



Social Aid Department of the Public Prosecutor's Office.

Her political career began in 1975, when she became a Councillor for the City of Luxembourg. In 1979 she became a Deputy. First, she is a member of the North Atlantic Assembly, then of the Parliamentary Assembly of the Council of Europe and the Western European Union. Within the Chamber of Deputies she takes the role of Chairman of the Petitions Committee. In addition, she is a member of the Finance and Budget Committee and the Defence Committee.
